

REPUBLICANS BREAK THEIR PROMISES TO THE MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM IN NEW JERSEY

This weekend, families everywhere will celebrate the anniversary of America's independence. As we celebrate, our communities will thank the thousands of brave men and women in uniform, who exemplify the spirit, sacrifice, and commitment of the American people to securing democracy throughout the world. And we will honor our veterans, who have asked so little and sacrificed so much for our country. But back in Washington DC, Republicans have quietly tried to cut corners when it comes to the needs of America's veterans and the courageous men and women in the military. They have tried to cut health care benefits for our veterans, refused to expand health care for men and women in the National Guard and Reserves, and rejected measures to keep them safe when they are fighting overseas. In fact, just this week the Administration admitted that they had underfunded veterans' health care by \$3.7 billion over the next two years. Democrats want to ensure that the men and women fighting for our freedom overseas do not have to fight the government for the benefits they earned when they return home.

MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM FROM NEW JERSEY NEED OUR SUPPORT

New Jersey has 4,449 men and women fighting overseas in Iraq and Afghanistan and 582,916 veterans. New Jersey has 1,681 members of the National Guard and Reserves fighting overseas in Iraq, as well as 2,768 from the active duty military. Veterans and members of the National Guard and Reserves face difficulties accessing health care. Over 500,000 veterans nationwide are locked out of the VA health care system altogether, including 13,338 in New Jersey because of arbitrary enrollment requirements put into place by the Bush Administration. And about 20 percent of all reservists do not have health insurance at all – approximately 4,063 in New Jersey, leaving them and their families without coverage when they leave active duty. Disabled veterans in New Jersey face delays, barriers to getting benefits they earned. More than 3,140 New Jersey veterans are still subject to the disabled veterans' tax, which forces veterans to sacrifice one dollar of their pension for every dollar they receive in disability benefits. In addition, there is a huge backlog of almost 500,000 compensation and pension claims, including those from veterans of the current war in Iraq and Afghanistan. Disabled veterans in New Jersey are waiting approximately 207 days for their disability assessment. Bush Proposed New \$250 User Fees and Double Prescription Drug Co-Payments For Veterans. At least 200,000 veterans would be driven out of the system entirely, including 35,965 in New Jersey, and it would cost New Jersey veterans remaining in the system more than \$3,320,740 over five years. Bush Budget Retains Disabled Veterans' Tax, Does Not Do Enough For Troops And Families. The Bush 2006 budget includes no targeted pay raises for senior noncommissioned officers, petty officers and warrant officers; has no money to fund the 2006 costs of proposed increases in death benefits; and would make no further progress in eliminating the so-called disabled veterans' tax, which requires military retirees to forfeit a dollar of retired pay for every dollar they receive in veterans' disability compensation.
