

REPUBLICANS BREAK THEIR PROMISES TO THE MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM IN PENNSYLVANIA

This weekend, families everywhere will celebrate the anniversary of America's independence. As we celebrate, our communities will thank the thousands of brave men and women in uniform, who exemplify the spirit, sacrifice, and commitment of the American people to securing democracy throughout the world. And we will honor our veterans, who have asked so little and sacrificed so much for our country. But back in Washington DC, Republicans have quietly tried to cut corners when it comes to the needs of America's veterans and the courageous men and women in the military. They have tried to cut health care benefits for our veterans, refused to expand health care for men and women in the National Guard and Reserves, and rejected measures to keep them safe when they are fighting overseas. In fact, just this week the Administration admitted that they had underfunded veterans' health care by \$3.7 billion over the next two years. Democrats want to ensure that the men and women fighting for our freedom overseas do not have to fight the government for the benefits they earned when they return home.

MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM FROM PENNSYLVANIA NEED OUR SUPPORT

Pennsylvania has 8,326 men and women fighting overseas in Iraq and Afghanistan and 1,145,918 veterans. Pennsylvania has 2,730 members of the National Guard and Reserves fighting overseas in Iraq, as well as 5,596 from the active duty military. Veterans and members of the National Guard and Reserves face difficulties accessing health care. Over 500,000 veterans nationwide are locked out of the VA health care system altogether, including 29,956 in Pennsylvania because of arbitrary enrollment requirements put into place by the Bush Administration. Just this week the Administration admitted that they had underfunded veterans' health care by \$3.7 billion over the next two years. And about 20 percent of all reservists do not have health insurance at all – approximately 6,583 in Pennsylvania, leaving them and their families without coverage when they leave active duty. Disabled veterans in Pennsylvania face delays, barriers to getting benefits they earned. More than 7,507 veterans in Pennsylvania are still subject to the disabled veterans' tax, which forces veterans to sacrifice one dollar of their pension for every dollar they receive in disability benefits. In addition, there is a huge backlog of almost 500,000 compensation and pension claims, including those from veterans of the current war in Iraq and Afghanistan. Disabled veterans in Pennsylvania are still waiting approximately 171 days for their disability assessment. REPUBLICANS HAVE FAILED OUR MILITARY AND VETERANS

Representatives Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach and Senator Santorum Opposed Expanding TRICARE to National Guard & Reserve Volunteers. Senator Santorum and Representatives Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach voted against expanding access to the military's TRICARE health insurance program to all reservist and National Guard members. The proposal would have expanded military health care to provide access to TRICARE to members of the Guard and Reserve and their families for a low fee, which would have helped 2,730 in Pennsylvania. Representatives Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach Opposed \$150 Million Increase for Military Personnel. In 2005, Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach voted against a proposal to the budget to increase funding for military health care by \$100 million and transitional job training for military personnel by \$50 million. Representatives Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach Voted Against Additional Job Assistance to Veterans Returning from Overseas. Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach opposed efforts to provide extra job training assistance to veterans who are returning from overseas. Four out of 10 members of the Guard and Reserve forces lose income when they leave their civilian jobs for active duty, and many are self-employed or run small businesses. This means they face the daunting task of reestablishing their businesses after their release from active duty. [HR 27, Roll Call #47, 3/2/05; 109th Congressional Record, pg. Senator Santorum Voted Against Improving Health Care for Veterans and Representatives Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach Refused To Consider \$2.6 Billion Increase in VA Health Care Funding. Senator Santorum voted against making a portion of VA funding mandatory or automatic, like other health related programs. Santorum also repeatedly voted against efforts to increase overall funding for veterans' medical care by almost \$2 billion. In addition, Representatives Dent, Fitzpatrick and Gerlach repeatedly voted to block efforts to increase VA funding by about \$2.5 billion. Just this week Republicans admitted that they had underfunded veterans' health care by \$3.7 billion over the next two years. THE BUSH ADMINISTRATION BROKE THEIR PROMISE TO OUR TROOPS

Bush Opposed Better Healthcare For Troops And Veterans, Underfunded Veterans Health Care by \$3.7 billion Over Two Years. OMB Director Josh Bolten opposed the allocation of “an additional \$1.3 billion for VA medical care and the provision that would expand benefits under the TRICARE Program.” Just this week the Administration admitted that they had underfunded veterans' health care by \$3.7 billion over the next two years. Bush Proposed New \$250 User Fees and Double Prescription Drug Co-Payments For Veterans. Bush's 2006 budget would more than double the co-payment charged to veterans for prescription drugs and would require some to pay a new user fee of \$250 a year for their health care. It would also increase the co-payment for a month's supply of a prescription drug to \$15, from the current \$7. At least 200,000 veterans would be driven out of the system entirely, including 67,538 in Pennsylvania, and it would cost Pennsylvania veterans remaining in the system more than \$2,081,991 over five years. Bush Budget Retains Disabled Veterans' Tax, Does Not Do Enough For Troops And Families. The Bush 2006 budget includes no targeted pay raises for senior noncommissioned officers, petty officers and warrant officers; has no money to fund the 2006 costs of proposed increases in death benefits; and would make no further progress in eliminating the so-called disabled veterans' tax, which requires military retirees to forfeit a dollar of retired pay for every dollar they receive in veterans' disability compensation.
